



Solitary Bees

Did you know that there are about 270 species of bee in the UK of which 90% are 'solitary bees'. They get this name as, unlike bumblebees and honeybees they do not live in complex colonies but nest individually, with the female lawing one or a few ages in a past with a parent of pallen and



GOD'S ACRE the female laying one or a few eggs in a nest with a parcel of pollen and nectar to feed the young when they first hatch. Some of the more common types of solitary bees include Mason, Mining and Leafcutter Bees.

Mason Bees build nests out of mud or clay. Have a look on the sunny walls of your church or chapel and see if there are any little mounds of mud, these could be mason bee nests. **Mining Bees**, nest underground, digging tunnels to create their nests. Areas of short grass and bare ground are preferred by mining bees. Burial grounds often contain small patches of bare earth or cracks in the ground around monuments which can be great for them.

Leafcutter Bees build a nest in a hole, crevice or hollow plant stem. They bite off circular pieces of leaf (particularly roses and bramble), which are then glued together using saliva to make a nest. Gaps between stones, old bits of wood and rough corners where dead stems are left will all be used by a variety of solitary bees.

Solitary bees are particularly important pollinators, perhaps because they lack pollen baskets on their legs so pollen both attaches and brushes off quite easily, spreading it around. Have a look for red mason bee which tends to use bee hotels, how about ashy mining bee which is striped black and white or the signs that leaf-cutter bees have been taking circles out of plant leaves.

You can help solitary bees by having a wide range of wildflowers and native grasses and a mosaic of short, long and tussocky grassland. How about a scruffy corner with some hogweed or bramble out of sight of the church entrance? This provides excellent nesting or overwintering cavities. People love to make bee hotels but don't forget that how you manage your local churchyard has a big effect too. Why not take photos of any bees you see and upload them onto the Naturalist app which will both help you identify them and also make a record so others can see what you've found.

Peak District National Park – Upcoming Walks

Saturday 1st June - The Aircraft Wrecks of Kinder Scout

10 miles. This walk covers some challenging terrain, including the steep ascent of Grindsbrook Clough to Kinder Scout plateau. You will discover the locations and background to four historic aircraft wreck sites including a Wellington, Halifax, Dragon Rapide and an Anson Mk 1. Dogs on leads are allowed. A high level of fitness and stamina is required. £15 per adult. Under 18s must be good walkers, but go free with a paying adult.

Sunday 2nd June - A Potted History of an Old Mining Village

4 miles. Explore Magpie Mine – the most complete example of a lead mine remaining in the Peak District, and enjoy wild flower meadows as you walk along old field tracks and paths. Enjoy far reaching views and local

history. Dogs on leads are allowed and must be on a lead at all times. £10 per adult. Children aged 17 and below go free with a paying adult.

Saturday 8th June - Mindfulness and Nature Connection Walk

5 miles. Appreciate the peace and tranquillity of the quiet areas and learn about aspects of mindfulness and connecting with nature with mindfulness trainer and ranger, Mike Pupius, and sound expert and ranger, Charlotte Swain. Walk through the historic Bolehill Quarries to Millstone Edge and Surprise View, returning through Padley Gorge, ending at Padley Chapel where there will be an opportunity to look inside. No dogs allowed on this walk. £10 per adult.

Ranger guided walks take place throughout the year and are a great way to build confidence in where to walk safely and to discover the health and wellbeing benefits of connecting more deeply with nature in the National Park.

QUESTIONS ABOUT THE PEAK DISTRICT



How many villages are in the Peak District?

The Peak District National Park encompasses over one hundred towns and villages within its boundaries, and many more bordering the park.

What are the demographics of The Peak District?

The ethnic group composition of the Peak District is very different to England and Wales as a whole. 99% of the total national park population were classified as White, compared with 86% for England and Wales. Within this ethnic group, White British was the largest, with 97% of people (36,837).

Why is Buxton not in The Peak District?

The boundaries were drawn to exclude built-up and industrial

areas; in particular Buxton and the quarries at the end of the Peak Dale corridor are surrounded on three sides by the park. Bakewell and many villages are in the national park, as is much of the rural west of Sheffield.

Why is The Peak District so famous?

The Peak District National Park is the UK's original national park. It is a treasured landscape of exceptional natural beauty shaped by the interaction of people and nature over thousands of years.

Why is it called The Peak District?

The name 'Peak' does not in fact relate to the region's uplands, but is thought to derive from the Pecsaetan, an Anglo-Saxon tribe which settled in the area. The lead for white paint in Vermeer's painting of Girl with a Pearl Earring came from the Peak District.

What is the biggest hill in The Peak District?

At 2,087 feet high, Kinder Scout is the highest point in the Peak District, and the views from its plateaux are awe-inspiring in the truest sense of the words.

What film was filmed at Chatsworth?

In the 2005 film adaptation of Pride and Prejudice, Chatsworth was used as Pemberley, the home of Mr Darcy.

What is the steepest walk in The Peak District?

Chrome and Parkhouse Hill (A.K.A. The Dragon's Back) are two of the peakier peaks in the Peak District, and whilst they are not the highest of hills in the area, they are certainly the steepest.

What is the highest village in The Peak District?

Flash has the distinction of being the highest village in England, at 1514 feet above sea level, and in winter it is frequently snow-bound.

Can you live in The Peak District?

The Peak District National Park is home to 38,000 people. There are challenges - for example high house prices, more elderly people and changes to how services are delivered.

What is an Ethel?

The Ethels are 95 hills in the Peak District of England, mostly over 400 m (1,300 ft) above sea level but including various prominent lower hills. The Ethels are a tribute to Ethel Haythornthwaite who pioneered the establishment of the Peak District as Britain's first national park in 1951.

PEAK DISTRICT NATIONAL PARK

Total – Population, Household and Economic activity projections

Projections have been developed using standard demographic methods and data as also used by government agencies, for the National Park area. The table below summarises the results for a census-based projection which assumed continuation of recent patterns of population change using census data on migration and population with vital statistics on births and deaths.

The report makes the following main conclusions:

1. If recent levels of birth, death, and migration rates continue the population of the National Park is projected to decline by 15% between 2001 and 2026 becoming increasingly elderly with over 49% of the population aged over 60 in 2026.

2. The age composition of migration is the key driver of this change. The total number of residents moving into the National Park is very similar to the number moving out, but out migration of those in child-bearing ages and in migration of those aged between 35 and 59 causes population decline as deaths exceed births.

3. The aging of the population projected in the National Park projections is greater but not unlike that projected for the remainder of the High Peak and Derbyshire Dales districts (derived from projections by Anglia Ruskin University) and for the East Midlands region and England (projected by the Office for National Statistics).

4. Alternative projections assuming 0 or 48 dwelling completions per year serve to reduce the extent of overall population decline. Assumptions of 95 or 150 dwelling completions per year imply an increase of population - should they be filled by households with no change in rates of vacancy and holiday homes.

5. The projected decline in the number of households is not as great as for the population. This is due to the decrease in average household size caused mainly by an increase in one person households countering the effect of the fall in population.

6. However, the decline in the working age population continues under all dwelling assumptions indicating that if the migration age structure remains as observed in the year prior to the census then increasing the dwellings to 150 will not counter the decline in the working age population.

7. Similar results to that of the National Park are generally found in its Derbyshire Dales and High Peak areas. However, in the smaller Staffordshire Moorlands area the migration profile has less impact on the population age structure and population decline is due directly to considerable net out migration CCSR: Population projections for the Peak District National Park Authority and East Midlands Regional Assembly.
