Wonderful Waxcaps



By October, the areas of long, meadow grass within a churchyard or cemetery will have been mown short and raked, making it is easy to wander around and look for colourful fungi. Old grasslands, like those found in burial grounds, have a fabulously complex web of life beneath the sward, of which fungi are a key part. These grassland fungi, which are different species from those found growing on trees or on deadwood on the ground, are 'indicator species' showing an observer that this grassland is precious, has not been

ploughed, fertilised or treated with chemicals for a long time (if ever).

The **mycelium** of the fungi is the part below ground, this consists of thread-like '**hyphae**' which may be connected to a range of grasses, mosses, trees and flowering plants. After rain, and often in the autumn, the mycelium pushes up the fungal equivalent of a fruit above the ground where we can see it. Fungi are largely made of water and so can appear quickly, pumped up by hydrostatic power. The purpose of this is to spread the species far and wide, with a single mushroom able to contain vast numbers of microscopic spores. In the grassland the fungi you find might be waxcaps and pinkgills both of which are shaped like a small mushroom, or spindles and earth tongues, both of which are long and thin. Many fungi are long-lived and may not fruit every year, some only fruiting once in a decade so are rarely seen. They continue to grow and spread bene ath the ground however.

Grassland fungi have long captured our imaginations as their names indicate. Look for scarlet, parrot, snowy, butter and ballerina waxcaps. How about skinny club, crested coral, golden spindles or hairy earthtongue.

Although shiny and brightly coloured, these grassland fungi can be difficult to identify as they can change colour with time. Some of the colours are water soluble so fade or change quickly, particularly if it rains. They are however delightful to look at, and even if you don't know which waxcap or spindle you are looking at, the presence of these grassland fungi is relevant and worth recording. If you take a photo of the top, side and ideally the underside showing the gills where the spores are found, it may be possible for someone to identify it, particularly if you use the iNaturalist app on a smartphone or tablet.

Grassland fungi need our help so please look after them. Always rake off the cuttings after mowing, strimming or

scything grassland, whether it is long or short grass. This helps to keep the soil fertility low which the fungi need, as do the wildflowers. Avoid any chemicals and keep grasslands managed with regular cutting so that they don't turn become coarse and rough. You may be rewarded with a scattering of colourful fungi looking like jewels across the sward. As well as looking pretty and adding to the richness of biodiversity they, and the other plants, lichens, invertebrates and microbes are all storing carbon in our soils, one of the many natural solutions to climate change.

Public urged to have their say in future Peak District National Park plans

Those who live, work in and visit the Peak District National Park are being asked for their views on strategic planning issues as part of a Local Plan Review consultation – the first review of its kind in around 15 years.

The National Park Authority's Policy & Communities team will seek views on house building, developing business and commercial properties, as well as protecting green spaces and the environment.

A series of roadshows will also take the message to villages across the Peak District with locals invited to come and learn more about how to take part. The consultation will be starting on 7 October and running until to 29 November 2024.

Following the consultation, the next Local Plan is expected to be shorter than previous plans and will combine information previously included across two separate documents – making it easier to understand and use.

Ken Smith, chair of the Peak District National Park Authority, said: "To misquote a

Monty Python line: 'What has the Local Plan ever done for us?' I can tell you that the answer includes affordable housing schemes at Bakewell, Bradwell, Taddington, Winster and Youlgrave; approvals for alternative renewable energies at Aldwark and Meerbrook; improvement of the visitor experience at Millers Dale station; replacement of two village halls at Over Haddon and

Parwich; business developments at Deepdale and Riverside in Bakewell; replacing older buildings with new on es that support our policies for conservation and recreation, such as the Boot and Bike hotel in the Hope Valley.

"These examples of positive recent developments show how important the Local Plan is; it's rooted partly in statute to conserve the special character and appearance of the National Park, but

also in people's aspirations for what building development is wanted and which green

spaces need to be protected in the areas that are important to them. Local

Plans capture these aspirations as a strategy for what can be developed and what needs to be protected, and set policies that make such aims possible when

we come to make decisions on planning applications. That's why we want people to take part in the consultation and let us know their views."

The Peak District National Park Authority's new local plan will shape future development in the National Park to 2045.

Planning policies set out in the new plan will guide decisions on

development proposals and planning applications in the National Park -

including everything from housing to quarrying.

Adele Metcalfe, policy and communities team manager for the Peak District National Park Authority, is responsible for carrying out the consultation. She said: "The new Local Plan will identify where development can and cannot take place in the National Park for the next 20 years, so we're expecting it to be of interest to everyone that lives and works in, visits or does business in the National Park, as well as those that care for it.

"We want the local plan to reflect the needs of our

communities so we want to encourage everyone to have their say. This is a great opportunity for people to tell us what issues and options are important to them for future developments in the Peak District National Park." The public consultation runs from 7th October to 29th November, 2024.

The consultation document will be online and accessed via an interactive portal as well being available as a downloadable pdf. Visit <u>www.peakdistrict.gov.uk/localplan</u> for more information.

Paper copies of the consultation document will be in local libraries, at the National Park headquarters at Aldern House in Bakewell, at constituent local authorities' offices, and with all Peak District National Park parish councils. People are invited to attend one of the consultation events that will be held at different venues in the National Park, including: Memorial Hall at Hathersage on 10th October; Memorial Hall at Parwich on 14th October; Sports Club at Hope on 15th October (1pm-5pm); Community Hall at Tideswell on 17th October; Village Hall at Youlgrave on 18th October; the Burton Institute at Winster on 21st October; Village Hall at Warslow on 22nd October; Village Hall at Low Bradfield on 8th November (4pm-8pm). These events will all take place between 3pm and 8pm, unless otherwise stated.

Message From the Community Bus Shelter



The Butterton Bus Shelter has reverted to its normal function; we have closed after six months of successful trading and fund raising. There was a lot of work involved in keeping the Shelter pristine and maintaining the quality and when the weather turns, it is no longer viable to keep it going.

We were open for exactly 180 days – that makes at least 540 visits to the Bus Shelter by the Shelter Elves; it has raised a record amount for local causes with many people happy that their unwanted books and bric-a-brac have found new homes.

As usual this year we have made grants to causes which have a local impact: the Air Ambulance, Mountain Rescue and the Manifold Pre-School. We also made a grant for a local person who recently recovered from a brain tumour, for the Brain Tumour Charity. Additionally, we hold funds to cover the cost of the proposed Memorial Garden for St Bartholomew's once the church authorities allow it. The Bus Shelter Charity which is called Butterton Community Giving Charity will hold its AGM in November, and we will update after this on decisions made for the future.

Thank you to everyone who has brought books or bric-a-brac to the Bus Shelter, and to those who have made donations for items. If you have something that you would like to donate, if at all possible please hold on to it until next spring when we will be opening again. In the meantime, please do not leave anything in the Bus Shelter.
